Palestinian Youth for Peace

The Palestinian Centre for Peace and Democracy is implementing a project entitled; *Palestinian Youth for Peace*, supported by the European Union, that aims to contribute in finding out a Palestinian public opinion supportive to a peaceful consensus in Palestine, on the two state solution, based on the international legitimacy resolutions and the Palestinian Declaration of Independence of 1988.

Activities of the project

First, conducting a training course to 54 youth representing 54 community based organizations, coming from all districts of the West Bank, where the group will be divided into two groups, 27 trainees in each group, for a period of three days for each group.

Second, Selection of 20 youth trainees among 54 trained youth in the first training. They will be enrolled into a five days training course; with the aim of developing their capacities, and transform the knowledge to the CBOs that they come from.

Third: Youth organize 54 training sessions at the halls of their CBOs.

Fourth: Trained youth organize 12 focus group discussions with 240 youth at universities, schools and youth clubs to discuss the current political situation and the proposed solutions; mainly the two state solution.

Fifth, develop the capacities of 10 trainees to be able to lead 48 television sessions with decision makers and leaders of the public opinion on the political solutions to build a democratic Palestinian state.

Sixth, conduct 48 political Symposia with public opinion makers on the peacebuilding process based on the two state solution.

Seventh: Conduct 48 television sessions with decision makers and leaders of the public opinion.

Eighth: youth campaigns to find out a Palestinian political strategy to end the conflict, to be later disseminated over the social media.

Ninth: conduct 24 hearing sessions to decision makers and public opinion makers on the political peace process to achieve the above-mentioned results.

Tenth: conduct 20 dialogue sessions with CBOs representatives and youth about future political strategies; and to come up with position papers about future political vision & strategy, then share these political papers to the decision makers.

With the start of the project, the PCPD will conduct an opinion poll to measure the knowledge and attitudes of the Palestinian public opinion towards possible political solutions, methods to end the occupation and find out a real political peace process to end the Palestinian Israeli conflict. The PCPD will conduct the same opinion poll again by the end of the project, to find out the change that the project has achieved.

The Palestinian Centre for Peace and Democracy

The Palestinian Centre for Peace and Democracy PCPD is a civil society non-for-profit Palestinian, non-governmental organization that is interested in democracy (political, social and participatory) and the PCPD works to achieve just peace based on international legislation in the poor and marginalized areas. Poll Opinion among Palestinians about Political Solutions

March-April 2022

Decline in the participation of youth in political life

A public opinion poll conducted by the Jerusalem Media and Communication Centre (JMCC) in partnership with the Palestinian Center for Peace and Democracy (PCPD) showed that Palestinian youth had strong stances on the need and possibility to play a significant role in public life and in the political arena, in particular. The majority of those polled, 77.8% agreed that youth have the ability and potential to play a more significant political role; as opposed to 21.2% who said, they did not. More specifically, the majority of respondents, 81.1% expressed the importance of youth membership in politburos, central committees and in the leadership of political parties, while 16.5% said the opposite. Perhaps the inability of youth to play leadership roles in the factions explains why 71.5% of respondents agreed there has been a major decline in youth membership in PLO factions and parties even though 22.7% opposed this.

As confirmation of this, the majority of respondents, 85.2%, said they did not participate in any political conferences or events, while 14.8% of those who said they had participated in political events 84% of them found that youth had a significant role in speaking in these conferences.

It seems that the setback in the political presence of youth has led to a relative decline their interest in following up on political events. Respondents were divided in their response to the question on whether they watched local television programs, with 43.4% who said they did watch television programs on local channels while 56.6% said they did not. In addition, 60.6% of those who watch television channels said youth participate in these programs as main speakers.

Ignorance about PLO program and Declaration of Independence

Meanwhile, the poll showed pessimism towards the possibility of reaching a peaceful solution between Palestinians and Israelis, with the majority of those polled, 75.1% who said they believed it was impossible to reach peace with Israel while 20.2% said the opposite. Moreover, the biggest percentage, 46.3% said they believed UN Resolutions 242 and 338 were not valid as a foundation for peace with Israel, while 19.8% said they were. It is noteworthy that around one-third of respondents, 30.1% said they did not know anything about these resolutions.

In the same context, it seems that political knowledge among people regarding the PLO's political program is limited, with 6% of respondents saying they had extensive knowledge of the PLO's political program and the declaration of independence, while 36.5% said they did not know anything about them. Meanwhile, 27.4% said they had moderate knowledge of them while 28.4% said they had little knowledge about them.

In spite of this, 60.4% said they still believed the PLO was the sole and legitimate representative of the Palestinian people, while 34.7% opposed this.

Following attempts to understand the position towards the declaration of independence. After explaining that it stipulates the 1967 borders are the borders of the Palestinian state, which is a civil and democratic Palestinian state that adheres to social justice and equality, the poll showed a division in their positions on this content, with 47.9% who agreed to it while 46% who said they opposed it.

People divided over methods of struggle

There was a clear divide regarding methods of political action and the most effective forms of struggle for achieving Palestinian goals, with 52.3% of those polled who considered armed struggle as the most effective way to achieve the Palestinian people's goals as opposed to 41.5% who said it was not. As for negotiations, 45.1% of respondents said it was an effective method for achieving Palestinian goals while 52.6% opposed this. Regarding popular resistance, the majority of respondents, 71.8%, said it was the most effective, while 25.3% said it was not.

In response to the question of which method was most effective in achieving Palestinian goals, there was relative proximity among them, with the biggest percentage, 22% saying that armed struggle was the most effective, followed by negotiations supported by popular resistance, at 20.8%, then armed resistance supported by popular resistance, at 15.2% and finally negotiations alone, at 15.1%.

Divided over PA and Hamas policies

Regarding the position of respondent over whether the PA or Hamas' policies were the better for ending the Israeli occupation and establishing a Palestinian state on the 1967 borders, 58.4% said the PA's policy was not the best way while 35% said it was. Likewise, regarding Hamas, 34.5% said its policy was the best for achieving these goals while 55% said it was not.

Best political solutions

The poll showed an overall shift away from the so-called peace process and its historic compromise, or the division of Palestine into two states, which was the acceptable solution among the majority of Palestinians in the past two decades. Around two-thirds of respondents, or 63.1%, opposed the solution to establish a Palestinian state on the 1967 borders alongside Israel, while 33.3% agreed to this solution. Meanwhile, the solution to establish the State of Palestine from the river to the sea won the most support by the majority of respondents, at 86%, with only 10.7% who opposed it. As for the so-called one democratic state in Palestine for Israelis and Palestinians, two-thirds of respondents, 66.6%, opposed this solution while one-third, 30.4% supported it. Furthermore, the majority of those polled, 78.6% opposed the two-state solution with negotiated land swaps, while 18.2% said they supported it.

When asked which is the best solution to the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, the majority agreed that a Palestinian state from the river to the sea was the best solution, at 74.8%, followed by a Palestinian state on the 1967 borders alongside Israel, at 8.4%, then by a democratic state for both Palestinians and Israelis, at 6.7% and finally a Palestinian state alongside Israel with negotiated land swaps, at 4.9%.

In regards to expectations on how realistic the two-state solution on the 1967 borders is, the majority of those polled, 68.3% said they did not think there was a possibility for this to happen in light of the settlement expansion policy, while 27.6% said the opposite.

Priorities of Palestinian People

The poll showed that the priorities of Palestinian people are somewhat scattered and not clear or focused. However, it revealed that achieving independence and establishing an independent Palestinian state in the West Bank with Jerusalem as its capital was the number one priority, at 34.5%, followed by the return of Palestinian refugees at 33.4%, then building a national economy and eradicating unemployment at 20.3%, followed by building a democratic system of government that respects human rights and freedoms, at 7.4%.

When asked what was the biggest problem facing Palestinian citizens, the biggest majority, 35.5% said corruption, followed by the continuing occupation, 31.5%, then poverty and unemployment at 22.9%, followed by the absence of democracy and freedom of opinion, at 5.7% and finally social restrictions at 2.9%.

Immigration is apparently not as much of a priority among Palestinians as believed. In response to a question about their desire to immigrate if given the chance, the biggest percentage of those polled, 69% said they did not want to immigrate, while 30.7% said they would like to immigrate, in varying degrees.

Methodology:

A random sample of 715 people between the age of 18 and 50 were interviewed face-to-face throughout the West Bank and Gaza Strip between 27th of March and 2nd of April 2022. The interviews were conducted in randomly selected homes, and the respondents inside each home were also selected randomly according to Kish tables. The interviews were conducted in 80 sampling points chosen randomly according to population.

In the West Bank 715, people were surveyed from the following areas:

Jerusalem: Hizma, Al-'Ezariya, Qalandia refugee camp, Al-Z'aiyem, Al- Ram & Dahiyet al Bareed, Sh'ufat, Old City, Beit Hanina, Al-Sawahreh al-Gharbiay & Jabal al-Mukaber, Silwan, Sur Baher, Ras al-Amoud. Bethlehem: Bethlehem, Beit Jala, Tuqu', Beit Fajjar, Al-Walaja, Ayda refugee camp. Nablus: Nablus, Beit Furik, Beita, Qusra, Talfit, As-Sawiya, Awarta, Ein Beit il Ma' refugee camp. Salfit: Salfit, Bruqin. Tulkarem: Tulkarem, Illar, Kafr Jammal, Tulkarem refugee camp. Qalqilya; Qalqilya, Jayyous.

The margin of error is ± 3 percent, with a confidence level of 95%.

Sample Distribution
